In choosing courses in your second, third, and fourth years, you should be keeping in mind and balancing the following goals

- Making progress toward graduationThis means taking your requid courses/credits (Professional ResponsibilityUpper Level Writing w/ Research & Citation Workshop, Upper Level Skills, Administrative/Regulatory) as early as you can, and ensuring that the number of credits you take per semester is moving you toward a total of 88 at the right rate.
- Taking courses ithe law school "core" -By "core" courses, we mean courses that manyyers and law teachers would agree are important for becoming a well-rided lawyer, regardless of student's particular area of interest. Such courses include Administrative Comporations, Criminal Procedure Evidence Family Law, International Law, and Wills.
- Exploring avanced certificates Paths to Practice and
